11TH HOUR RACING COMES TO BRISTOL YACHT CLUB

On December 3rd, distinguished ocean racer and BYC member Charlie Enright provided a multi-media presentation of Team 11th Hour's Ocean Race challenges and ultimate victory. The packed house was glued to their seats listening to Charlie recounting his travels around the globe, including gut wrenching crashes. Charlie described the team's near-loss when, at the start of the last leg, they were T-boned by a competitor and forced to retire from the race. After an excruciating multi-day wait for a decision on redress, the team was awarded enough points to win the competition.

11th Hour Racing also claimed a major victory by successfully encouraging each of the competitors to support ocean scientists by collecting invaluable data from seldom traversed areas of the Southern Oceans. Their samples will lead the charge on ocean sustainability. Charlie explained how it all started here at the BYC: first entering the EBSF program as a student, then as an instructor. BYC members Chris Brito and Peter Levesque, both spoke of their experiences sailing with Charlie over the years. It was Pete, however, who landed the line of the night. While looking straight at Charlie, he said, "Some heroes wear capes while others round them." Bravo, Pete, well said!

Tom Enright left us with his departing story. "When your child has a passion, make it happen. We never said no. We just packed the car with the boat, gear, kids, and headed to the next regatta - CT, NJ, the Chesapeake, Miami, Arkansas ...Life changing!"

It was a fitting end to the evening when Commodore Paul Redman unveiled BYC's new perpetual trophy--the ***Enright Outstanding Achievement in Offshore Sailing Award***--which hangs in the Chart Room.

Charlie's name is engraved on the trophy as the first recipient.

Hungry Pelican is an Oceanis 41 owned by Aria Olumi and Sareh Parangi

Why the name *Hungry Pelican*?

The answer is best described in Aria's own words:

Hungry Pelican is our sailboat's name that refers to an adventurous vessel with a light hearted crew that is curious, enthusiastic about sailing, and has a lively character. Pelicans are known for their voracious appetite, their ability to catch and store fish while swimming because of their long beak with a large pouch. They are social birds that adapt to many different environments. Warm Weather, New Faces, Dedicated Volunteers Launch BYC 2023-24 Frostbite Season



The Bristol weather gods delivered warm, light-air sailing to kick off the BYC 2023-24 frostbite season. PRO Will Pierce, supported by BYC volunteers, served up seven solid days of competitive racing to both familiar sail numbers and new faces.

Although our first annual "Stuffie Regatta" fell victim to rain and wind, a shirt sleeves (really!) day with 70-plus degree temperatures, light wind,

and a touch of "diamonds on the bay" kicked off our fall series. Then six more days of 50-ish temperatures, with one "frigid" 37degree day sneaking in.

Fall Series congratulations to Eric Aker, Patrick Chokron, and Jeff Curtis for their top positions in the Aero fleet; and to William DeLong, Adam Langerman and Faye Flam who topped the Laser fleet.

The BYC frostbite fleet continues to grow; a visiting AERO racer from Washington state, a URI student and a Quincy, MA, high schooler, new Bristol and Barrington residents (including a soon-to-be BYC intermediate member), and a father and son from Medford, MA. Three new faces sailed chartered boats from EBSF and RWU in the Fall Series; a fourth is coming in January (See Zim Sailing donation to EBSF, also in this month's Mainsheet.)

Add in our regulars from ME, MA, and RI and the BYC Fall Series stats tell the story: 10-15 Laser and Aero sailors on the line enjoying 5-8 races each day in winds ranging from light to moderate to NNW 8-16, gusting to 22. In total, 27 male & female racers ages 17-77, 85 races, and 557 starts over seven Saturdays.

These stats were enabled by a dedicated team of volunteers who spend Saturday afternoons on the water so frostbiters can race. Will Pierce has served as our frostbite

PRO for over 30 years. Pete Turenne drives the safety boat after BYC has been "put to bed" for the Fall. Volunteers Ian Clarke, Nancy Clarke, Steve Crocker, Doug Laroche, Peter Maloney, Sue McKay, Charlie Payne, Bob Yaylaian, and Nick Fontela filled 23 "shifts" as PRO, driver, scorer, and deckhand during the fall series.

How come so many sailors drive hours to frostbite at BYC? The draw? It's Bristol Harbor's protected setting, BYC's outstanding facilities, easy launching minutes from the starting line, hot water baths for boats and drivers, and our Chartroom for post-race drinks and debriefing. Most importantly, an experienced Race Committee that delivers 7-ish diverse races each day. All that topped off with massively supportive camaraderie - a big factor when frostbiting. Come join us!

Sailors helping sailors was in play during the last Fall Series Race. With the safety boat moving the windward mark in response to shifty winds, an accidental gybe caught one or our racers by surprise at the leeward mark. Recovering from a downwind capsiz to windward is never easy or fun, especially when unexpected. Two racers immediately closed in to offer help; one went in the 43 degree water to expedite righting and return to boat. The other passed on the next race to help with launch ramp recovery and de-rigging. Now that's supportive camaraderie!



Zim Sailing Donates ILCA/Laser Hull to EBSF

Zim Sailing has donated a like new ILCA hull to EBSF for BYC frostbiting and youth regattas. Zim's objective is to increase participation by potential ILCA/Laser sailors year-round who do not currently have a boat.

This 2021 hull from Zim's charter fleet has been fully reconditioned and is in mint condition. We already have it chartered for the BYC Winter Frostbite Series.

Laser charters typically include the hull only. Sailors traditionally bring their own sails, blades, rigging, and even mast sections and booms.

We quickly acquired a new sail, cover, and beach dolly. We are now putting out a call for donations of spars, blades and rigging, including fittings, micro-blocks and line for vang, outhaul, and Cunningham controls. We hope to line up donated equipment as soon as possible. Hats off to John Bell for equipment loan to start BYC Winter Frostbite Series on January 6 without delay!
